Free Wi-fi coming soon for all guests of Sydney / Sydney Eye Hospital

This Wi-Fi is just one of many new technology initiatives funded by the kind people who donate to the Sydney Eye Hospital Foundation.

Another Foundation initiative has included Sydney / Sydney

Eye Hospital in a navigational app for people who are blind or have low vision. This audio app directs visitors to inside the hospital from the train station and bus stops, or to clinic and ward entrances. Once activated it will warn users about hazards such as stairs or obstacles.
