## TECHNOLOGY – SAVING SIGHT FOR MORE PEOPLE.

A new imaging machine will improve diagnosis and patient comfort at the Sydney Eye Hospital and help to reduce sight loss for more people.

The Sydney Eye Hospital Foundation is raising funds to purchase three new optical coherence tomography (OCT) machines – the Zeiss CIRRUS 5000 HD-OCT – for the hospital.

OCT is a technique that uses light to capture three-dimensional images of the microscopic detail of the retina and other parts of the eye. With a strong light source in the instrumentation, these devices can achieve extremely high resolution, creating images of tiny eye structures that are less than one thousandth of a millimetre. For example, they can image red blood cell flow and distinctive layers of the retina.

Each new generation of OCT equipment is able to do more than the previous models, faster and better.

The Cirrus 5000 will provide the detailed information that, up until now, has only been available with an invasive procedure. The old method to look for leaking or abnormal blood vessels in the eye required dye to be injected into the patient's arm through a cannula. The procedure can be painful and time consuming, and there is a one-in-10,000 risk that the dye may trigger a severe, life-threatening allergic reaction. The dye can also make patients feel nauseous and unwell.

Instead of tracking dye, the new OCT technology tracks the flow of red blood cells through vessels in the retina. It is now a simple scan test which is much more comfortable for patients. It is also much quicker, taking less than 30 seconds for a simple scan.



### *Help for common causes of sight loss*

By mapping and tracking the retina, iris, cornea and other parts of the eye, the OCT helps ophthalmologists to monitor and treat a range of eye diseases, including glaucoma, age-related macular degeneration and diabetic eye disease – three of the most common causes of sight loss today.

The sophisticated system enables high resolution scans to be captured in identical locations of the eye from each patient visit, which provides data for precise assessment of changes and disease progress.

The Sydney Eye Hospital has been testing the effectiveness of a Zeiss CIRRUS 5000 HD-OCT and has noted that overall waiting times during appointments has reduced. The machines are easier for technicians to use and much more comfortable for patients.

As waiting times are reduced – by up to 50 per cent – many more people can be tested each day.

It all adds up to better eye care and saved sight for more people.


**DR KAY LAM**




**DR NICK TOALSTER**
