## About

The Sydney Eye Hospital, established in 1882, is the largest eye hospital in the southern hemisphere. The hospital was originally the ophthalmic department of the old Sydney 'Infirmary' (Sydney Hospital), which was founded with the settlement of the Colony in 1788.

In 2022, Sydney Hospital and Sydney Eye Hospital (SSEH) is now a major public hospital specialising in Ophthalmology, Hand Surgery, Drug & Alcohol and Sexual Health within the South Eastern Sydney Local Health District (SESLHD). Other specialty services include General Medicine and ENT. There is also a separate Eye Emergency Department as well as a General Emergency Department.

The Hospital has a long-standing reputation for treating the highest acuity and complex patient loads, attracting referrals on a state-wide and national basis.

The Hospital is a teaching hospital with an onsite ophthalmic academic unit for Sydney University and has academic associations with the University of NSW and the University of Technology, Sydney.

- There will be a cataract and IOL component to the Fellowship and liaison will occur with the Head of the IOL Unit Dr Robert McDonald (Intraocular Implant Unit Head and Principal Fellow co-supervisor, IOL on timetable).

Main Duties and Responsibilities
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Work as part of, and contribute to a multi-disciplinary team</li><li>- Provide assistance to registrars in the day to day care of inpatients</li><li>- Provide assistance to the Outpatient Clinic</li><li>- Provide assistance to Acute Ophthalmic Service (AOS)</li></ul> <p><i>NOTE: AOS clinic provides follow-up for patients who have been referred from the Eye Emergency department. Participation in this clinic provides fellows with the opportunity to organise and triage their own subspecialty referrals, and to maintain their clinical skills in other ophthalmic subspecialties.</i></p>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Attend operating sessions (under the supervision of the attending Ophthalmologist)</li> <li>- Provide assistance to the Eye Emergency Department to assess ophthalmic problems and advise on care (under the supervision of the attending Ophthalmologist)</li> <li>- Attend all relevant Clinical Meetings</li> <li>- Participation in Grand Rounds and Ophthalmic Teaching Sessions</li> <li>- Participate in clinical and laboratory research activities</li> <li>- Participation in the Postgraduate Teaching Program organised by the Corneal Unit</li> <li>- Participation in Clinical Risk Management</li> <li>- Teaching and supervising of Ophthalmic Registrars/Residents in wards, clinics, operating</li> <li>- To remain on the on-call roster for after-hours (for duration of Fellowship)</li> <li>- To fulfil duties as outlined in the position description.</li> <li>- Compliance with all legislative, policy/protocol requirements in relation to SSEH.</li> <li>- Provide a report upon the completion of your Fellowship outlining your experience.</li> <li>- To exercise independent judgement initiative and problem solving skills, in consultation with supervising medical staff as needed.</li> <li>- Fellow may require affiliation with the University of Sydney, through research undertaken at the Save Sight Institute (SSI) located at 8 Macquarie St, Sydney NSW.</li> </ul>
<b>Main Goals and Objectives</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Develop strong working relationships with a multidisciplinary workforce.</li> <li>- Understand and be committed to organisational mission and goals.</li> <li>- Ensure a high standard of medical care and documentation for all patients.</li> <li>- Acquire the knowledge and skills required for critical assessment of the research literature and to become a productive clinical investigator.</li> </ul>
<b>Key Performance Areas</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- The Fellow has a nominated Supervisor, The Head of the Corneal Unit, who will undertake quarterly performance assessment and review.</li> <li>- This includes the assessment of clinical skills and knowledge base, clinical judgement, decision making, emergency skills, procedural skills, communication, teamwork and professional responsibility.</li> </ul> <p><b>We expect our Fellows by completion of the one-year fellowship to:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Complete between 40-60 corneal transplant surgical cases in the year and will assist in a further 25-50 cases. They will be competent in independently corneal and ocular surface disorders, including trauma, infections, keratoconus, and surgical complications.</li> <li>- Complete approx. 50 cataract procedures and assist in approx. 50 cataract procedures, and be competent in other aspects of anterior segment surgery, including managing complicated cataract extraction and the surgical complications, insertion of various implants, lamellar corneal surgery, and collagen cross-linking.</li> <li>- Be competent in interpretation of corneal imaging, including corneal topography, confocal microscopy and ultrasound bio microscopy.</li> <li>- Acquire skills in research including preparing research findings for publication and presentation and in the conduct of clinical trials</li> </ul>
<b>Induction Training</b> <p>All new Fellows that commence at the beginning of the Clinical Year will attend Junior Medical Officer (JMO) Orientation that is conducted by the Hospital's Medical Administration in addition to individual orientation provided by the Clinical Supervisor. Fellows that commence in July will need to liaise with SEHF Fellowship Coordinator to organise the following training:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Pharmacy Orientation</li> <li>- Medical Records Orientation</li> <li>- Basic Life Support (BLS) Training</li> <li>- eMR Training &amp; Support</li> <li>- Fire &amp; Internal Emergency Training</li> <li>- PPE Testing</li> <li>- Mask Fit Testing</li> </ul>
